- Each unit must have two 21-year-old or older registered adult leaders in camp. For units with female youth at least one of the leaders must be a female. There are also sibling discounts (\$50.00 dollars off for each sibling) and a returning youth for that season will get a discount of \$125.00 dollars off a second week. There are no sibling discounts after the fact. These must be anticipated by the unit before they arrive at camp.
 - If your unit wants to arrive on Saturday, there is an extra fee of \$10 per person
- <u>Commissioner</u>: Adults that want to help camp by being Volunteer Commissioners can come to camp for free. If you sign up to be a volunteer commissioner, you are expected to serve in that capacity. **There are a limited number of spots per week. Call the Fresno Office to find out more at (559) 320-2100.** Each unit can have only one Volunteer Commissioner.
- Transfers: You may transfer funds from one youth and adults/leaders in the same unit to another.
- <u>Health Care & First Response Professionals</u>: Adults that would like to help camp by being a Volunteer Camp Health Officer for the week will have their camp registration waived. If you agree up to be the volunteer camp health officer for the week you are expected to serve in that capacity. There is one slot per week. The professional credentials include licensed MD, DO, RN, LVN, LPN, RN, Licensed nurse practitioner, Licensed Physician Assistant, Paramedic or EMT. Please call the Fresno Office to find out more at (559) 320-2100.

Payment Dates

- Deposit of \$20 per person, Youth and Adults, on reservation form.
- January 31st, a payment of \$125 per person (both youth and adults)
- Feb 28th, a second payment of \$125 per person (both youth and adults)
- March 31st, a third payment of \$175 per youth and \$50 per adult
- April 30th, Paid in full
- After April 30th, you may not lower your numbers and will pay for the youth or adult even if they don't come to camp. You may have last minute additions and that is fine.
- There are no refunds.
- If a unit misses their payment dates and does not contact the Sequoia Council Office your reservation may be cancelled, and all fees paid are forfeited and your site given to another unit.
- To qualify for Merit Badge Signups, you must have both the January and February payments submitted.

Conservative Forecasting

When you make reservations for the summer, be conservative. Forecast on the lower end. You can always add more Scouts. **Caution**: if you bring a surprising 10 extra youth, you are wise to phone the Council Office with a "heads up". Conversely, if you indicate you are bringing 12 youth and 2 adults (fully paid or not) and you arrive at camp with only 10 youth, we cannot make a refund. If not yet fully paid, you will be responsible to pay full fees. These fees cannot be pushed into the next camping year. If you overbook your site, units will need to provide their own tents and sleeping accommodations for their campers above camp site capacity.

Sharing a Campsite

If you reserve a campsite and do not take up all the spots in a site, we may put another unit in the campsite with you to share the site. We post all the units that are in the campsite online at the camp website, https://www.seqbsa.org/camp-chawanakee so you can see if you are sharing the campsite with another unit. If you are sharing a campsite, please wait for the other unit so that you may divide the site appropriately. We manage our campsites to make sure every unit can get to camp. We thank you in advance for your understanding.

Camperships

We believe that every youth should have the option to go to summer camp and we are committed to making this happen. We encourage units to participate in fundraisers to help defer the cost of camp such as Annual Popcorn Sales. However, sometimes a little extra is needed. Through the generous donations of people and businesses around the Sequoia Council we are happy to be able to offer scholarships "camperships" to summer camp for all youth attending. If you have a family that needs assistance have them fill out a campership application. You can download the application at https://247scouting.com/forms/027-2023campership

All applications must be in the office March 31st . Please note that for the unit to get the campership discount, the youth must go to camp. Camperships are announced in mid

April, if you applied for a campership you may want to refrain from paying your full balance until awards are announced.

Refunds

In general, there are no refunds at Camp Chawanakee. For unusual situation refunds will be considered on a "caseby-case" basis. Requests can be made by contacting the Council Office.

Program

This leader guide represents the plan and expectations for Camp Chawanakee regarding program and administration. The Sequoia Council, Boy Scouts of America reserves the prerogative to modify this operational and program guide in accordance with circumstances beyond council control. This would include but is not limited to local or regional public health or environmental disruptions and disasters.

Visitors

Visitors are welcome at Camp Chawanakee. Visitors **MUST** report to the Camp Office and comply with any required check-in procedures. Visitors will be given a wristband that must be worn during their entire stay at camp. Visitor meals are available, and meal tickets can be purchased at the Trading Post. Visitors cannot participate in program activities. If you are planning on staying the night there is a \$65.00 per night charge, regardless whether you eat in the dining hall or not.

YOUR SUMMER CAMP EXPERIENCE

There is something very appealing to our youth about packing up their gear and going camping for a week. Six nights and seven days in the woods to experience the mountains, sleeping in a tent near a lake; it is quite an adventure. An adventure that no troop can duplicate on their own back home. A week in camp builds memories that will never be forgotten. We look forward to another amazing camp season with you this summer!

<u>AN ACCREDITED CAMP</u>: Camp Chawanakee is accredited each summer by the BSA National Camp Accreditation Program. This means that the camp has met strict guidelines in health, safety, and programming. We are prepared for emergencies and understand that Scouts and Scouters are in our care. We take pride in making sure we meet these standards in all areas of our camp.

<u>CAMP PROGRAM</u>: To us, program is more than merit badge classes. It is also specialty programs and camp wide games. It includes flag ceremonies and campfires. It's the songs and the cheers. We believe that program is everything you experience, from the time you step out of your car until you are headed back home. We believe we are prepared to deliver one of America's best camp programs. New Scouts will enjoy our First Year Camper program, while your older Scouts can choose to be challenged in our High Adventure programs. We know that every troop is different and approaches merit badge work in their own way. We have developed a curriculum that has variety, and we are looking forward to helping you plan the program that is best for your members.

<u>THE STAFF</u>: We hire the best candidates for each position and complete a week-long staff training program before we see any Scouts. In addition, several of our Area Directors must be certified at a National Camp School Training session, prior to serving with us. We are dedicated, we are enthusiastic, and we are here to serve.

You will be hard-pressed to find a better staff than the people we are bringing together for this summer.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

The following forms are required by all participants attending Camp Chawanakee. Please ensure your troop has each form ready for submission at check in upon your arrival.

Troop Forms

Unit Roster: You will need to have two copies of your Roster. You will need one copy for Medical Checks and one copy for your campsite. The Roster must have name and phone numbers for each person at camp.

If you are changing your adults partway through the week, please make sure both adult names and phone numbers are on your unit's roster.

Shooting Permission Forms: As per California State Law anyone who is under the age of 18 and wants to use the Rifle or Shotgun ranges needs to have this signed form. You will turn these into the camp office during check in.

Individual Forms

The camp check-in procedure is currently listed in accordance with the 2022 policy, the 2023 policy will be based upon current Fresno County guidelines and modified accordingly.

Health Forms: The BSA Annual Health and Medical Record must be completed in its entirety for ALL Camp Chawanakee participants. Please ensure each Scout and Scouter has completed the form and attained the required physician physical within 12 months of attendance. 1. If you are asymptomatic (according to check in form) & fully vaccinated for COVID (see below) you are OK for check in.

a. https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/stay-up-to-date.html

b. You are up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines when you have received all doses in the primary series and all boosters recommended for you, when eligible.

2. If you are asymptomatic (according to check in form) and not fully vaccinated, campers require a negative COVID (antigen test) within 24 hours of check in or a negative COVID (PCR) test within 72 hours of check in.

a. The Camp will accept a dated photo of a home antigen COVID test taken within 24 hours of camp check in.

California AB 506

As a Scouting volunteer, you understand the importance of keeping children safe. A recent bill (AB 506) was passed by the State of California requiring volunteers and staff of Youth Service Organizations to complete training in child abuse and neglect reporting and undergo Live Scan background checks.

AB 506 goes into effect on January 1, 2022. All registered BSA volunteer positions and employees including camp staff must comply with AB506. In addition, other volunteers who are 18 years of age or older and who have direct contact with, or supervision of, children for more than 16 hours a month or 32 hours per year must complete a Live Scan background check (the digital version of inked fingerprinting) and complete online mandated reporter training.

All staff and volunteers, age 18 or over at Camp Chawanakee will be in compliance with AB 506.

An out-of-state troop is planning a visit to Camp Chawanakee. Is the troop subject to AB 506?

AB-506 applies to all California youth service organizations. Out-of-state troops who visit California are not subject to AB-506. While those troops are not subject to AB-506, visiting troops must follow both BSA policies and the laws of their own state. Failure to comply with BSA policies and/or the laws of their own state may restrict an out-of-state troop's ability to visit California.

All adults accompanying a Scouting unit who are present at the activity for 72 total hours or more must be registered as leaders. The 72 hours need not be consecutive.

WHAT TO BRING

Troop Gear List

Your campsite will be your home away from home. Each Troop or patrol will need to set up its area. Please refer to the following lists to ensure you are well prepared.

Uniforms

We encourage your youth to wear full uniform for evening flag ceremonies each day. Youth should arrive and leave camp in full uniform. We do not mandate a unit wear the official uniform as it is the unit's decision to make.

Troop Gear

Unit flag, US flag, Patrol flag, First Aid Kit, Patrol cook kit (pot or kettle, spatula, tongs, frying pan, ice chest, charcoal chimney) and a small shovel. You can request an American Flag for your unit to perform your own flag retirement ceremony. We suggest you bring a water cooler for your camp site for easy access to more drinking water. A pop up for shade would be a good item to bring for your tables.

Personal Gear to Bring to Camp: (see next page)

The weather at Camp Chawanakee for most of the summer is sunny and warm. It can be cooler in the early morning and evenings so "Be Prepared" for all kinds of weather including cold and rain. Pack appropriate clothing for the season, outdoor essentials, extra shoes/boots (closed toed recommended), a pack (a backpack is suggested), sleeping bag, pillow, foam pad or air mattress, ground cloth, eating kit (spoon, fork, knife, plate, bowl, and a cup) toiletries (soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, comb/brush, wash cloth, towel), full uniform (Field and Activity). Flip flops should not be worn walking around camp, but only in the shower room areas or in Waterfront Area.

Personal Gear-Extras to Enhance Your Stay

Watch, camera, insect repellent, sunglasses, binoculars, OA sash, fishing pole and tackle, swimsuit, water shoes. Anyone 16 years of age or older requires a valid California Fishing License. Camp Chawanakee does not sell fishing licenses. You will need to go into the town of Shaver to purchase one. Please consider purchasing prior to arriving.

<u>NOTES</u>

This equipment list is meant to serve as a general guide. Please use your own discretion in choosing what to bring to camp and what to leave at home. We recommend that Scoutmasters inspect all backpacks to ensure proper safety. We are in an Extreme High Risk Fire Area, please be careful!

What Not to Bring

Personal firearms (including Peace Officer weapons), ammunition, personal archery equipment, slingshots, wrist-rockets, fireworks, alcohol, illegal drugs, ATVs, motorized dirt bikes, electric bikes or scooters, skateboards, personal watercraft (without prior clearance with the Camp Director/Aquatics Director) and pets, except for service animals.

Marijuana is not allowed in any form in Scouting activities.

Please hold a familiarization meeting with your youth and their parents. This is a good time to complete the necessary paperwork. <u>Make sure that each participant (including adults) has a B.S.A.</u> Annual Health and Medical Record <u>(Parts A, B, & C) filled out and signed by a doctor.</u> Leaders should pay attention to Part B: Parental consent regarding nonprescription medication administration.

Saturday Arrivals

Units can choose to arrive Saturday after 3 PM. Units are required to provide their own food until Sunday Dinner. Aside from Chapel, Showers and Restrooms, there are no program areas or facilities available to units that arrive on Saturday. Please do not go swimming in the lake. Camp Management staff members are on site in case of emergencies only. The Camp Office is closed on Saturday afternoons, please go directly to your site, but please make sure to do your official check in on Sunday at the Camp Office.

Transportation

Each unit is responsible for arranging transportation for their youth to and from Camp Chawanakee. Cars must be parked in the Camp parking lot, **PLEASE BACK THEM IN**. Due to limited parking space, car-pooling is highly recommended. Those arriving by bus should advise their driver to turn right at the top of the parking lot and proceed to the front of the warehouse. Arrival at camp is advised to be between 12:00 noon and 1:00 pm on Sunday. No passengers can be transported in truck beds or trailers. Motorcycles, ATV's, Jet skis are not permitted at camp. Personal boats may not be docked at campsites. If you have a watercraft and would like to dock it at the camp waterfront, please contact the Camp Director (campdirector@seqbsa.org) prior to arrival at camp for discussion. For Emergency Considerations, and to avoid high gas prices in the local area, we recommend all vehicles staying in camp have at least ¹/₂ tank of gasoline. You may want to fill up on your way to camp. Prices are considerably higher nearby.

Camp Chawanakee does not have the capacity to charge electric vehicles.

The camp road is now asphalt. The speed limit is 15 mph while driving on the camp road.

IN-CAMP ADMINISTRATION

The adventure begins once you arrive at Camp Chawanakee. The first day's activities will set the tone for your Troop's week at camp.

First Day

Sunday check-in is at the Camp Office. Your unit needs to call the Camp Office during business hours at 559-841-2117 to make an appointment of your confirmed arrival time. The Adult Leader most familiar with your youth and the unit's finances should check in.

Each unit will get a camp staff guide assigned to them to provide an orientation of camp and act as your buddy for the week. This orientation will include medical, Dining Hall orientation to find out your eating session and table numbers, and a swim test (we recommend that participants wear their swim trunks under their uniform). You can conduct Swim Tests prior to your arrival. We will be doing Medical Arrival Screening. While on the tour please ask questions, it is the best way to learn about Camp Chawanakee. Your guide will take you on a detailed tour of camp.

A UNIT LEADER/YOUTH LEADER meeting is scheduled Sunday afternoon at 5:00 pm at the Chapel.

Unloading Gear at Camp and Camp Site Vehicle Parking:


Cars will not be allowed to stay parked in campsites. Troop equipment trailers may be parked at campsite, but the tow vehicle must be parked back in the parking lot. Each unit will still be allowed to bring one vehicle (at a time) in to unload troop gear on arrival. All other vehicles must be parked in the camp parking lot. There will be no exceptions to this policy outside of specific authorized unit needs. Units leaving on Friday night will be allowed to bring a vehicle into campsite to pack up. You will be able to bring one vehicle in at a time between 1:00PM and 4:00PM. Units leaving Saturday will wait until that morning to bring a vehicle in.

CAMPSITES

Each campsite is equipped with tents, cots, and mattress for all attendees, a table, and bulletin board. Rakes, brooms, and shovels can be checked out at the Camp Office. Please only take one of each per Troop. There will be a sign out sheet at the office. Patrol site equipment consists of on average four two-person tents, eight cots, eight mattresses, one stand-alone BBQ and one picnic table. It is recommended that units bring their own dining canopies. Garbage cans will be strategically placed for easy access by patrol sites. Do not put charcoal or campfire ashes in the trashcans. Units who damage camp property will be charged an amount to repair and/or replace that property. The cost of a new camp tent is \$1200 and the frame that supports it is another \$700.

Early Swim Check: Saving Time on Sunday Check In

To speed up your Sunday arrival process, we highly recommend that your Troop do swim checks before coming to camp. **Buddy tags will be mailed out to the units in April.** Fill out buddy tags in advance. Keep in mind that our camp is located at an elevation of 5,300 ft. above sea level and the water is cold. The aquatic staff also may retest a person if they feel this is necessary.



DINING HALL PROCEDURES

The Dining Hall at Camp Chawanakee can feed over 400 people. Please help us by following these procedures to ensure a safe and efficient mealtime.

Breakfast, lunch and dinners are served cafeteria style in the Dining Hall each day. During lunch, we will provide a "grab and go" sack lunch option. Please do your best to be on-time for your shift. The Friday dinner is a Hawaiianthemed B.B.Q. meal. At the Sunday tour you will be assigned a table(s) and given details for clean-up. Each table accommodates eight people. Units are asked to invite a staff member to join them if there is an open seat. Milk is always available at breakfast and dinner.

For safety reasons, we are not providing "cook in camp" lunches as in recent years. Should you need to work on specific needs for Cooking Merit Badge, speak to our Food Services Director upon arrival, and we will accommodate your needs to the best of our ability.

<u>Troop Bus (table steward)</u>

After the troop is finished eating each unit is responsible for completely bussing their tables as instructed by the dining hall steward.

<u>Entry:</u>

Troops will line up on the outside of the Dining Hall, on the side closest to the Training Center. The Dining Hall Steward will open the doors for entry. Hand sanitizing stations are provided, and we ask each participant to make use of these before entering for each meal.

Seconds:

At most meals, seconds will be called after a short delay from the time the last person was served. Please be respectful and responsible when lining up for seconds. We never expect anyone to go hungry at camp.

Special Meals/Dietary Concerns:

Camp Chawanakee accommodates vegan, vegetarian & gluten free diets on a routine basis. Campers requiring other or religious dietary meals need to contact the camp director at campdirector@seqbsa.org at time of registration and a minimum one month prior to arrival. You may wish to bring food/meals for your needs. We will store these for you at the Dining Hall. food allergies must be indicated at time of camp registration Please let us know if you have a birthday in your unit during your stay in camp.

<u>Guest Meal Prices:</u>

If you have a guest, they can purchase meal tickets at the Camp Trading Post. Breakfast and Lunch are \$10.00, and dinner is \$13.00. Children age 5 and younger eat for FREE.

MAIL SERVICE

Letters or postcards can take anywhere from two to five *extra days to* get to camp. Address your mail in the following manner (be sure to include unit number, session, and campsite) also be sure parents are aware of this information, so they can write their youth at camp.

When mail is received at camp it is sorted into boxes for each campsite in the office. It is up to the units to come by daily and check for mail in the afternoon. Any mail that isn't picked up will be put in the unit's check out packet at the end of the week. If mail comes after your stay at camp is over, we will return it to the sender. **It is suggested that you print a copy of this page and distribute it to all parents prior to leaving for camp.**

CAMP CHAWANAKEE TRADING POST

The Trading Post is your "one-stop-shop" for all your needs at camp. From snacks, drinks, and candy, to camping sundries, Scouting supplies, merit badge items, and souvenirs, the Trading Post has everything you'll need to make your week at camp a memorable one.

We recommend that Scouts bring between \$50.00 to \$60.00 each to pay for souvenirs, snacks, and supplies during the week. Remember that certain merit badges do require the purchase of supplies (See Merit Badge listings). Many troops have an adult leader supervise a banking system to help Scouts monitor their spending. While we have no requirements for the use of a banking system, it is recommended, and helps develop spending skills.

In the Spring, we will announce details of our Trading Posts pre-order program. By pre-ordering your 2023 camp t-shirts, you can ensure your troop is fully outfitted during your stay at camp.

CAMP EXPECTATIONS

Every community has a set of standards to function safely and comfortably while encouraging a fun and learning environment. Camp Chawanakee is our community for the summer. Below are some important points to keep in mind while in camp.

Uniform: The uniform helps to establish a sense of belonging and a certain measure of safety in the camp environment. As such, Scouts and leaders must wear the field uniform for evening colors and the activity uniform for breakfast/lunch and during program hours. The activity uniform can be any Scout t-shirt and shorts. During the day, all Scouts are encouraged to wear some type of Scout shirt.

Buddy System: Everyone must follow the Buddy System while in and out of camp. Guests should have a buddy for all activities and may be asked to return to their campsite if found without a buddy.

Hazing: Hazing is prohibited both at Camp Chawanakee and by law. Defined as any action taken or situation created which recklessly or intentionally endangers the mental or physical health or safety of any person or which willfully destroys or removes public or private property in order to initiate, admit into, or affiliate a person with an organization or membership; hazing will not be tolerated at Camp Chawanakee and may be grounds for immediate dismissal from Camp.

Off-Limits Areas: We ask that all attendees of Camp Chawanakee avoid certain areas of camp. Those areas include:

Staff Areas: lounge, cabins and living quarters, laundry area.

Any program or service area that is designated as Closed: Waterfront, Field Sports, Program Areas.

Other troop campsites: please only send an SPL or adults into another campsite if necessary.

The camp maintenance yard and warehouse (unless with a class).

Cleanliness: Please help us to keep camp clean. Troops are responsible to keep their campsite, tent platforms, and other areas clean throughout your stay. Please make sure Scouts use trash cans and recycle when possible. For any major cleanliness issues please contact the maintenance crew as soon as possible.

Internet Access: There will be limited wireless internet access for adult leaders located in the adult lounge daily from 9:00am- 12:00pm.

Smoking Area: Smoking is absolutely forbidden for any Scouts in camp. Adult smokers may partake in one area of camp only, which is behind the Dining Hall near the dumpster pad. We ask that you help us maintain vigilance. CAMP CHAWANAKEE IS AN EXTREME FIRE DANGER ZONE AND WE ASK EVERYONE'S HELP IN MINIMIZING RISK. You can do so by ensuring all who smoke do so only in the designated area.

Fires: Use only the designated campfire circle in the traditional campsites to build fires. Fire control tools are located at each campsite. No fireworks in camp. New fire pits *may not* be constructed in the patrol sites. Campsite fires must be kept small. Flames should be no higher than two feet.



EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

We will practice an Emergency Drill on Monday. When you hear the sounding of the fire bell all Scouts and Leaders will report to the Waterfront Area, quickly and safely. Once each unit has assembled in a line the Scoutmaster or SPL will report their attendance to the designated staff member. All units will remain at the Waterfront Area until the ALL CLEAR has been sounded or further instructions are given.

Major Accidents and Emergencies

In the event of a major accident, health-related emergency, or serious illness please report the incident to the nearest camp staff member. Be as specific as possible and relay only factual, pertinent information.

If medical attention is required during the night, please contact the Camp Health Officer directly. The Camp Health Officer will provide a cell phone contact, and there is a camp radio in the Health Lodge available to call for help. If 911 is called, the Camp Director, or his designee, must be notified immediately. In general, camp staff should be activating the 911 call.

Fire Bell

The fire bells are located at the Training Center and on the rock behind the parade area by the Trading Post. The fire bell will be rung in the event of an emergency that may require either a full camp head count, and/or evacuation. I.E. Fire, lost swimmer, lost person, or another emergency. Any other tampering or use of the fire bells is STRICTLY forbidden.

Drivers of vehicles should carry vehicle keys on their person in case of emergency.

What to do if you encounter an out-of-control fire

Do not attempt to put out the fire yourself! Take the most immediate and safest route to a fire bell and begin to ring it loudly. Continue to ring the bell until a staff member relieves you.

PROGRAM INFORMATION PLANNING YOUR PROGRAM

Online Registration

Scouts should be registered online at www.247scouting.com for all merit badges before coming to camp. Changes can be made through Monday at Lunch, but we recommend all schedules be established prior to arrival.

The following pages provide a brief overview of Camp's various programs. A complete chart of merit badges, together with any prerequisites and their schedule, is listed in this leader's guide.

MERIT BADGE PROGRAM & INSTRUCTIONAL AREAS

The purpose of the Camp Chawanakee merit badge program is to offer programming that is not readily available at home and utilizes the outdoor experience. Each merit badge is assigned an area in camp that is responsible for its instruction. All in-camp questions about specific Merit Badges should be brought to the attention of the Area Director.

The day is divided into morning sessions and open study in the afternoon or evening. Most merit badges are offered during the first four sessions of the day, with many troop or individual activities being offered during the afternoon and evening sessions.

Some merit badges can only be completed if certain requirements are done prior to camp. If a Scout has not completed these requirements the merit badge will have to be completed at home.

Scoutcraft Located next to Archery Range/ Offers:

Camping, Cooking, Fire Safety, Fishing, Orienteering, Pioneering, Search and Rescue, and Wilderness First Aid. Eagle Point Located at the Lodge on the Point/ Offers:

Chess, Emergency Preparedness, First Aid, Geocaching, Robotics, Citizenship in the World, Communications, Game Design, Disabilities Awareness, Signs, Signals and Codes.

Nature Lodge Located East of Archery Range/ Offers:

Astronomy, Bird Study, Environmental Science, Fish and Wildlife, Geology, Mammal Study, Pulp and Paper, Nature, Reptile and Amphibian Study, Mining in Society, Soil and Water.

Handicraft Lodge Located Next to the Bridge/ Offers:

Basketry, Fingerprinting, Indian Lore, Leatherwork, Photography, Pottery, Wood Carving

Shooting/Field Sports Located at the Ranges/ Offers:

Archery, Rifle, Shotgun

Waterfront Located at Aquatics Area/ Offers:

Canoeing, Kayaking, Lifesaving, Rowing, Small Boat Sailing, Swimming, BSA Lifeguard

Climbing Wall & C.O.P.E. Course Located Near Flag Assembly Area

Welding Located on Staff Hill

Merit Badge Sign-Up

Please make sure registration is done prior to arrival at camp. Unit Leaders will be able to sign up youth/adults for classes on or after March 20th, 2023. You will have to have your February payment receipted in the Fresno Office. Certain classes have size restrictions. Classes are filled on a first come first serve basis.

<u>Open Study</u>

Afternoon (2:15pm - 4:30pm) and Evening Open Study (7:00pm - 8:00pm) are times campers can experience program areas in an open format. Every program area (except for COPE and Climbing) will be open. Youth can work on merit badge requirements or just have fun.

Merit Badge Advancement / Blue Cards

Camp Chawanakee uses the Black Pug Camp Management system to keep track of merit badge progress. Troop Leadership can follow progress during camp using the Black Pug Mobile App. Each youth who is working on merit badges will have their progress recorded during the week.

Camp will have some blue cards on hand. If your unit chooses to use blue cards, they will be completed.

If you get home from camp and find that there was a problem with a blue card or the advancement report, contact Sequoia Council at campdirector@seqbsa.org. This goes for any past summers as well. Let us know the youths name, unit, council, what week they attended, what merit badge you need and your mailing address.

Registration Cut Off and Class Changes at Camp

Each session of camp, merit badge sign-ups will be closed Thursday at midnight <u>before</u> you come to camp so that we can get the rosters ready for the next week. Once this happens, you won't be able to change any more classes online. If a camper decides they want to change a class at camp, they can still do so. When adding a new class on site your Scout is required to talk to the counselor and let them know they want to add the class. The switch will be dependent on the available class size roster.

CAMP ACTIVITIES

Opening Campfire

Start your week off right on Sunday night when our staff puts on the opening campfire at Eagle Point Campfire Bowl for your entertainment and enjoyment.

<u>Unit Campfires</u>

Your unit can have a campfire in your campsite during the week. You can use only downed wood that you find at camp. Do not damage, trim, or cut standing trees. If a tree appears hazardous, inform a staff member right away.

Tribe of Chawanakee Campfire

On Thursday night the spirit of the Native Americans who inhabited this land when Camp Chawanakee was just a dream, will come out to induct new members into the tribe and to advance in rank those who have returned. The highlight of this campfire is the reading of the legend followed by an induction ceremony for the Tribe Honor to which you are advancing. The evening ends with all the Tribe members listening to the sage advice of the mighty Sachem. Members must either have completed their service hours prior to this campfire or promise on their honor they will have them done before leaving camp. Adults are encouraged to participate too!

Closing Campfire

Friday evening at the Eagle Point Campfire Bowl there will be a variety show to remember and our troops provide the songs and skits. That's right, units and youth are the main attraction here, so plan to participate.

<u>Nature Trail</u>

This self-guided tour takes you through the beautiful meadows of Camp Chawanakee. Along the trail you will find signs that will explain the flora and fauna that can be seen throughout camp. If you have any questions, ask the staff at the Nature Lodge.

Fishing Derby

Measure your fish either caught or "catch and release." The longest fish (or photo with ruler) each week will be recognized.

This competition is a youth-only competition. Youth aged 16 and older require a valid California Fishing License. We do not sell licenses in camp.

Adult Leader Information

Adult Leader Trainings

While in camp, we have several opportunities to help Adult Leaders impact the lives of your Scouts. Camp Chawanakee offers multiple programs to help maximize your time and continual learning. Leaders can complete the following trainings at Camp Chawanakee: Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster Leader Specific Training and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. For completion, this requires almost a full day of work each day at camp.

Medical Support

A First Aid trained staff (Camp Staff Member – Camp Health Officer) is present at camp to treat medical emergencies and handle minor problems. For urgent and emergency care, not requiring ambulance transport, it will be necessary for leaders to transport youth to a local Urgent Care or Emergency Room. Medications must be kept in a locked container. Units must bring their own locking container. Unit Adult leaders are responsible for logging the proper medication at the time given to Scout. If you are a medical professional, please identify yourself to camp management for emergency purposes. For those adults who need to use a CPAP machine, there is no electricity at any of the campsites, please bring your own power source.

Commissioner Service

Commissioners are one of the key ingredients for the unit to have an outstanding week. Any needs, concerns and/or suggestions should be directed to your commissioner. Campsites will be inspected by your commissioner daily. Campsite inspection scores are a key component to determining who wins the coveted "thumb-stick" award. The Council has a limited number of paid Commissioner spots for each week. If you want to volunteer to help you need to contact the Fresno Scout Office and talk to our camping department.

Adult CPR & AED Training

Each Tuesday AM (9:00 – 11:30 AM) at the Training Center there will be Adult CPR Training. The Training is certified by ECSI. The cost is \$25 paid at the Trading Post. This training does not meet the requirements for BSA Lifeguard certification. The Lifesaving First Aid and CPR class is held each Monday at 8:00 PM and Tuesday at 7:00 PM at the Training Center. The Lifesaving First Aid and CPR class is subject to change.

First Year Camper Program

Location: Camp Chapel

This is a camp staffed activity, first year campers should attend one of two sessions (period 1-2 or periods 3-4). Adults are strongly encouraged to accompany their Scouts to this program area. New or younger Scouts along with their adult leaders will receive an opportunity to learn the skills needed to achieve the rank of First Class. They will work together on a variety of activities and skills including nature, hiking, orienteering, pioneering, first aid, and more. Recording advancement for Ranks First Class and below are handled entirely at the Troop level. You do not need a blue card for First Year Camper. Scouts will be able to also work First Year Camper Program requirements during free time and open time at various program areas. Further information will be available at the opening adult leader meeting.

Polar Bear Swim

Each Tuesday through Friday mornings, all the brave souls in camp will meet at the waterfront and swim in subarctic waters. Don't worry, we won't let such bravery go un-rewarded.

Mile Swim

This test of strength and endurance is a four-day event. To adjust to the altitude of Chawanakee, participants will be required to swim increments building up to the full mile. All must be successful on each preceding leg to advance to the next. Each leg MUST be accomplished on different days. Each swimmer will be required to provide a skilled rower and spotter to ensure their safety and success. Only one swimmer per boat is allowed.

B.S.A. Lifeguard

Adults must have equivalent skills to merit badges. Cost: \$50.00 (Purchase ticket at the Camp Trading Post) If you already have the appropriate CPR & Advanced First Aid Training, you do not need to pay \$50.00 to get recertified. Must show proof of certification (Appropriate CPR & Advanced First Aid). Cost includes required CPR / Advanced First Aid Training & Certification. Period Held: 2 through 4 plus Free Time.

A BSA Lifeguard can be a vital part for unit outings. Our staff will help show your future lifeguards the proper techniques on how to keep a safe waterfront. A requirement is to be a strong and responsible swimmer age 15 and older. Adults are welcome to participate. B.S.A. Lifeguard is a two-year certification.

The Canoe Outpost is a chance to get out of camp and see other parts of beautiful Shaver Lake. Participants can paddle or row across the lake and camp under the stars. A cracker barrel will be provided. While on the other side, you can spend an evening enjoying leisure activities such as fishing, practicing your skills or just have a good ol' campfire. Two Deep Leadership is required for the Canoe Outpost. Canoe Outpost is subject to weather conditions. Sorry, swimming is not allowed. You will need to bring your own sleeping bag, ground cloth, mat and water. You will need to provide your own waterproof or dry sac bag. Please clean up your litter at Canoe Outpost.



Mountain Bikes

We allow personal bikes in camp. Everyone must wear a helmet, shoes, and eye protection. Please use caution while riding your bike in camp, especially around other campers, and near buildings and structures. Be a courteous cyclist. Camp Chawanakee does not provide bikes.

Pioneer Hiker

Pioneer hikers meet at the Camp Office after the Friday evening Campfire when further instructions will be given. Each unit can send one youth. Turn in the name to the Program Director at the 10:00 am Friday Leader's meeting or anytime before 4:00 pm.

Honor Troop/Crew

An honor unit is one that adheres to the Scout Oath and Law in all their dealings. Honor units demonstrate superior Scout spirit, have consistently high inspection scores, use the patrol method, and participate in programs and meetings. All honor units will be recognized at the closing campfire. Turn in Honor Unit paperwork to the office anytime during the day on Friday. The requirements for the Honor Unit Program are at the end of this leader guide.

Spirited Arrow Award

The purpose of the Spirited Arrow award is to encourage Scout Spirit. The unit with the most enthusiasm, that is always doing their best, will be given this award. Judgment will be based on Patrols having flags, patrol yells, doing good turns and youth simply doing their best to take pride in Scouting, but most of all, HAVING FUN! The award will be given out at the closing campfire.

Thumb Sticks

Each evening, the Camp Commissioner will each give out a special award known as a Thumb Stick. Thumb Stick winners will keep and add to the Thumb Stick until the next evening's flags, where it will be returned to the Commissioner. At the end of the week, one unit will take home the Thumb Stick. The additions to the Thumb Stick, your unit's own personalization, should not make it larger than your smallest youth can carry.

Tribe of Chawanakee

The Tribe of Chawanakee is our in-camp service organization. Initial tribe patch is purchased at Trading Post. Segments are awarded at no cost. This program is designed to recognize Youth and Adults who exemplify Chawanakee's ideals. All Youth and Adults who attend camp are eligible for membership. On Thursday night, all the hard work from the week will culminate in a ceremony and campfire. The segments that go around the patch are given to you at checkout. If you want to receive your segments you must turn in your Tribe Roster Form by Friday to allow time to sort out all the segments. The ranks and corresponding requirements are:

SWIM CLASSIFICATION PROCEDURES

The swim classification of individuals participating in a Boy Scouts of America activity is a key element in both Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat. **The swim classification tests should be renewed annually, preferably at the beginning of each outdoor season.** Traditionally, the swim classification test has only been conducted at a long-term summer camp. However, there is no restriction that this be the only place the test can be conducted. It may be more useful to conduct the swim classification prior to a unit going to summer camp. All persons participating in BSA aquatics are classified according to swimming ability. The classification tests and test procedures have been developed and structured to demonstrate a skill level consistent with the circumstances in which the individual will be in the water (e.g., the swimmer's test demonstrates the minimum level of swimming ability for recreational and instructional activity in a confined body of water with a maximum 12-foot depth).

In April we will mail each unit their buddy tags to fill out before arriving at camp. The various components of each test evaluate the several skills essential to the minimum level of swimming ability. Each step of the test is important and should be followed as listed below:

SWIMMER'S TEST:

Jump feet first into water over the head in depth, level off, and begin swimming. Swim 75 yards in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: sidestroke, breaststroke, trudgen, or crawl; then swim 25 yards using an easy resting backstroke. The 100 yards must be swum continuously and include at least one sharp turn. After completing the swim, rest by floating.

BEGINNER'S TEST:

Jump feet first into water over the head in depth, level off, swim 25 feet on the surface, stop, turn sharply, resume swimming as before, and return to starting place.

Beginners (red on top):

- ✓ Jump into deep water.
- ✓ Swim 25 feet.
- ✓ Turn.
- ✓ Return.
- ✓ Total: **50 feet** with entry and turn

Swimmers (red on top blue on bottom):


- ✓ Jump into deep water.
- \checkmark Swim 75 yards with strong forward stroke.
- ✓ Swim 25 yards with restful backstroke.
- ✓ Rest by floating.
- ✓ Total: 100 yards with entry and turn

Properly filling out a buddy tag:

The swimmer's name is put on the front in the middle section. On the backside is written their Unit Number and Campsite.

- Non- Swimmer (did not pass to the Beginner level): Buddy Tag left without color
- **Beginner** (passed Beginner level but did not complete full swim test or did not complete test to the satisfaction of the test administrator): Color the top half circle with a red permanent marker.
- **Swimmer** (satisfactorily completed the full swim test): Color the top half circle with a red permanent marker and color the bottom half circle with a blue permanent marker.





Early Release From Camp

Once a Scout has checked into the summer camp program, they are not authorized to leave the camp property except in emergency situations, and with proper verification and authorization. Emergency situations which may cause a request for "early release" include illness, family emergencies, or unavoidable outside activities. The following procedures are followed whenever any "early release" request is made:

• If any person other than the parent or legal guardian will pick up the Scout, a **written authorization** from the custodial parent or guardian must be supplied to the Camp Director. This authorization must state who is authorized to pick up the Scout.

• Upon arrival at camp, the adult picking up the Scout must **check in with the Camp Director** at the Camp Office. After verification, the Camp Director will contact the Adult Leader and the Scout.

• The **identity of the adult picking up the Scout must be verified** by the Adult Leader in camp and/or by the presentation of proper identification. If a parent of legal guardian must be contacted via telephone to verify authorization; it must be at a telephone number supplied by the Adult Leader in camp, or at a telephone number listed on the health record of the Scout.

• If an adult leader is taking a Scout home during the camp week, they must check out with the Camp Director and they must inform the Camp Director upon their return to camp. If the Scout is not directly related to the adult leader, **two-deep leadership guidelines** must be followed.
